| <p>This tp. is very rough in the 3 N. tiers of Secs. The Walla Walla River extends from E. to W. across these tiers and runs through a deep canyon, on either side of which steep, precipitous ground rises to a great height. Numerous small streams put into the Walla Walla River from both the N. and the S.</p> <p>The Tp. is well watered and is covered with excellent grasses for grazing. There is considerable timber in portions, of the Tp.</p> <p>There are 5 settlers in the N. portion of the Tp.</p> <p>C.G. Rogers has a claim in Sec. 8, and has a cabin and considerable land enclosed.</p> <p>J.N. Reavis has a claim in Sec. 19, upon which he has a dwelling house and out-buildings.</p> <p>P.
